Course Goals: Empower learners with the knowledge, skills and abilities (KSAs) to perform the job performance requirements (JPRs) of a Level 1 Youth Firesetting Intervention Specialist (YFIS) as outlined in the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Standard 1035.

Target Audience: The target audience for this course is anyone who has or will have responsibility to prevent or mitigate the occurrence of youth firesetting. The audience could include volunteer and career firefighters, fire investigators, Fire and Life Safety Educators (FLSEs), and allied professionals from criminal justice, mental health, social services and juvenile justice.
